Athlone - At the heart of it

Athlone, a vibrant and bustling town in the heart of Ireland, serves as a vital nexus within the broader Midlands Region. With a growing population of 22,869, Athlone straddles two provinces, Leinster and Connaught. This central and strategic location positions the town as the ideal gateway between East and West, North and South — being only 60 minutes from Galway City and just 90 minutes from Dublin Airport and Limerick.

Athlone is recognised as the regional growth centre in the Regional Spatial and Economic Strategy. The town's strategic importance is further evidenced by thriving industry clusters in ICT, life sciences, medical technology, and engineering. These clusters draw upon a skilled labour force from the Technological University of the Shannon (TUS) Athlone, as well as the wide array of industry-focused courses and research centres. Matched with real engagement and substantial support from local and national business development organisations, Athlone stands as a beacon of economic vitality and a testament to the synergistic power of community, culture, and innovation.

Athlone has also seen significant investments in the town's infrastructure and public amenities, affirming Athlone's designation as a 'European City of the Future' for Human Capital and Lifestyle by fDi Intelligence from the Financial Times. The town's rich cultural tapestry and history is apparent, centred on the River Shannon, with landmarks like Athlone Castle and the Luan Gallery, as well as the Galway to Dublin Greenway, which runs through the Cultural Quarter. It all combines to offer an excellent environment in which to live, work and visit.

Quality of Life


Athlone is a vibrant town steeped in history. Centred around Athlone Castle and the Cultural Quarter, the town offers a thriving food and drink scene, including two Michelin Guide restaurants and Sean's Bar, the oldest pub in Europe, an iconic venue for locals and visitors to enjoy a drink and experience traditional Irish music.


Set on the River Shannon at the edge of Lough Ree, Athlone offers ample outdoor and water recreational activities. These include the Athlone Marina, Lough Ree Yacht Club, the Royal Canal Greenway, Old Rail Trail and the Shannon Banks Nature Trail.


Athlone is also a flourishing arts and cultural hub, hosting the All-Ireland Drama Festival since 1953. The towns arts scene features two theatres: the Dean Crowe Theatre and the Athlone Little Theatre. The Luan Gallery showcases the most interesting artists from the Midlands, Ireland and abroad, while the Abbey Road Artists' Studios offer a dedicated space for local and visiting artists. The town is also home to various community and voluntary groups as well as an array of sports facilities and teams.

Green Transport Athlone

Athlone is home to Ireland's first all-electric urban bus service. Saving up to 400,000kg of CO_2 annually, the service has resulted in a 25% increase in passenger numbers and includes 11 state-of-the-art vehicles, with dedicated charging infrastructure. In addition, Athlone has introduced a town bicycle scheme, EV charging hubs and numerous investments in active travel infrastructure.







Education, Training & Skills

The main education, training and skills offerings in Athlone are the third level education provider TUS Athlone, and the LWETB Athlone Training Centre.

TUS is home to 6,495 students and 200+ industry-focused courses. The university has been hugely significant for the region with an estimated economic impact of €429m annually. TUS graduates have been named Ireland's most employable, with 86.9% of 2022 honours graduates in employment and more than 60% of graduates taking up employment within the region.

TUS Athlone has a reputation for world-class athletics and state-of-the-art facilities. In recent years, the campus has undergone significant development, now boasting a €70m, 13,000sq.m. Engineering and Informatics facility, a 2,000 seater €10m International Sports Arena and a state-of-the-art €4m Apprenticeship Facility with capacity for up to 1,000 apprentices annually. Construction is also nearing completion on a new 6,000sq.m. STEM building, with capacity for up to 1,000 students.

The campus hosts three research centres, two technology gateways, and an industry cluster. These entities span software engineering, interactive media technologies, life sciences, engineering and advanced manufacturing. As a founding member of RUN-EU, TUS collaborates with 100,000 students, 11,000 staff, and 100+ research institutes across the EU.

The Longford and Westmeath Education and Training Board (LWETB) is dedicated to supporting individuals entering the labour market, transitioning careers, or expanding their skill sets. The LWETB also places a strong emphasis on enterprise support and upskilling in future-ready skills such as advanced manufacturing, sustainability, and digitalisation. With planned future investments for a state-of-the-art facility on campus, the LWETB Athlone Training Centre is distinguished nationally for its focus on advanced manufacturing and engineering.
